NAIDOC 2007 Looking Forward, Looking Blak

AIDOC festivities will be held all over the country this month to celebrate the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

Held over the first week of July each year, NAIDOC week is celebrated not just in the Indigenous community, but in all communities across Australia.

The theme for this year's NAIDOC Week is 50 Years: Looking Forward, Looking Blak, with the focus city for 2007 being Darwin in the Northern Territory.

The NAIDOC Ball and Awards Ceremony will be held here on the aptly named Black Friday – Friday, July 13, 2007. The NAIDOC Awards recognise the outstanding achievements of Indigenous Australians in such categories as the Elder of the Year, the Indigenous Person of the Year and the Lifetime Achievement Award.

Speaking of awards, the Deadly Vibe team have our very own winner, with our junior designer, Tyeli Hannah, winning the 2007 NAIDOC Poster competition.

Tyeli's artwork is called The Path We Lead and joins a NAIDOC tradition that can be traced back to 1972, when the poster competition began. The strong imagery and bold colours Tyeli has used represent Indigenous people and their journey over the past 50 years, while the figure climbing the staircase is carrying battle-torn Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags towards a brighter future – a future where all Australians are equal.

"I wanted people, especially Indigenous people, to feel as if the future holds positive things for them," Tyeli says. "As an Indigenous person, there are a lot of hard things to deal with in life, but there are also a lot a great things and that's what we should be celebrating.

"We need to recognise and strive to achieve good things in life, as well as deal with the negative stuff."
